RIDE PLANNING SITE for N.E.

How do you plan for a long distance ride? By this I don't mean "how to plan to tell your wife." I don't mean "how to plan what to take or how to load your bike." What I'm talking about is planning for best routes, hotels, restaurants, and scenic views. I typically talk to club members, look at GPS maps with points-of-interest, drag out old magazines, and even go through AAA books/pamphlets. There are also magazines that show motorcycle routes such as the MOA magazine/ website and Road Runner magazine.



The challenge with this approach is that I have to look back at old magazines and web pages to fine my tar-

get area. (The good thing about the MOA is that a few months before their National Rally and Get-a-Way rallies, they publish articles and routes by local clubs.) There are also some good websites/companies that provide best routes but they may have a fee, such as Ride-with-GPS (https://www.rwgps.com) and Road-runner magazine.

Well, I just found a motorcycle website created by the New England Riders (NER) Club that provides a lot of details on places and routes in the North East U.S. and Canada. This is the same club that I wrote about last month where they published how to use the Garmin BaseCamp software. https://www.newenglandriders.org/b-o-n-e

Their Best of the NorthEast (or "BONE") presents a list of roads that have been vetted and reaffirmed by NER members over many years. You can choose 13 areas (regions) to research. Travel attractions and amenities are recommended and rated by your fellow riders, especially in relation to visiting them by motorcycle. What you get besides a map view and a downloadable GPX file for your GPS (see figure). This includes waypoints and points of interest. The downloaded GPX routes can be complex with many turns they are best displayed and followed using good mapping software like Garmin BaseCamp or other and/or a dedicated GPS device. NER members update our listings and GPX files frequently, based on the firsthand experience and input from the rider community. Check back often to get the most recent data. You can choose items to look for: Roads, attractions, scenic v iews, restaurants, hotels, dirt roads, camp grounds, etc. URL links to other information are also included for border crossing info, area maps, parks and tourism information. Good luck if you are going to the North East this year. Hope you find this useful. If you have other great planning software/sites, then go ahead and write an article for our newsletter.

BMW Airheads SuperTech

The Airheads BMW Club Supertech was held February 9-11 at the Boyertown Museum of Historic Vehicles in, perhaps unsurprisingly, Boyertown, PA. About 120 airhead BMW owners from surrounding states attended this event. As usual, the event was organized by the PA Airheads, with 15 classes presented on Saturday and also Sunday morning.

Topics covered the gamut of Airhead BMW motorcycle repair and maintenance: replacing push rod tube seals, lacing spoked wheels, and transmission work and more. There was a presentation by the owner of Powerseal USA about the technology and practical aspects of re-finishing cylinder walls. Yours truly gave a talk (mostly a Q&A) about working on the typical Airhead BMW electrical system.



After dinner, before the speaker's presentation. Friday night was an informal meet and greet, which included pizza. Saturday night there was a catered dinner in the museum, and a talk by revered BMW mechanic Tom Cutter, reminiscing on his life and times.

The Boyertown Museum of Historic Vehicles was a truck manufacturing plant for a large part of the 20th century, and now is home to a large collection of antique cars and trucks (and the occasional motorcycle). In addition, there was a trav-

eling exhibit of Fire apparatus in the lobby. In our downtime, the attendees and presenters could walk around and enjoy the exhibited machines.

In addition to all of that, the local Airheads BMW Club owns a set of cutaway models. There are cutaway transmissions, engines, and the Maryland branch of the club brought their "Sliced Cycle", an entire early 70's BMW "slash 5" that has been cutaway so all the gubbins are visible.

I've been going to this event for several (10?) years, and I highly recommend it. When the weather is too cold go ride anywhere, the next best thing is hanging out with your riding buddies learning about your motorcycle. Highly recommended.

BDR FILM AT CROSS COUNTY CYCLE/BMW


If this article sounds like the one last year,... it is, basically because I used the general front-end and added the specifics for this year's BDR.

BDR for those not familiar is the Back Discover Routes organization. It is an adventure-based group that creates outstanding off-road rides all over the United States. BDR is a non-profit organization like MOA, RA, Airheads and most local clubs. Their rides start with months, if not years of research on the best route from point to point within a region. In the past they've created, videoed and published routes in WA, CO, IA, NV, UT, AZ, NM, MA (mid Atlantic, several states), CA (south), NE (North East), WY, and OR. This year's route being shown at Dealers and other selected sites is 940 miles across Northern California. Their routes cross public roads and lands (not private property) and over paved and dirt roads. But many of their routes are on mountainous fire roads, rough dirt roads and trails. The routes, downloadable for your GPS/phone, also identify "expert" rough terrain/trails. As BDR's videos show, usually 7-10 riders do the ride for video purposes. The film is EXCELLENT with professional-looking video and pictures, taken from in-front, behind, and above (a lot of drone videos). BDR provides a video trailer on their website, full video, free tracks, interactive maps, photos, as well as camping, hotel, food and gas information. Packing lists, discovery points and FAQs for each route are included. As time goes on, they publish Route Updates to insure the latest information is available. Most of the BDR route videos are now available for viewing on their website... for free. Just select the Route and the video is shows along with GPS tracks, Q&As, and other. https://ridebdr.com

Cross Country Cycles/BMW at Metuchen was well prepared on March 22 (Thursday evening) www.crosscountrycycle.net. About 150 were in attendance. Club members who were there included Prez Jeff Diorio, Joe Karol, Robert Sherman and me. Our club's MOA representative, Vince Kelly, also attended. The show room was packed with bikes upstairs and down as well as several located outdoors. Three new 2023 R1300GS' were lined up at the front door. It looks like they are set for great spring/summer sales.

The Northern California BDR film lasted over an hour. Hardly anybody moved once the BDR film started except for a few of us who flinched and groaned as a rider fell or crossed a particularly difficult bolder-ridden and rutted path. The 940 mile Backcountry Discovery Route was a multiday off-pavement ride designed for adventure and dual-sport motorcycles. It happened in September - October 2023. The route started from far-east of San Francisco and explored north to the Oregon Border, Challenges included a lot of rocks, silt, sand, and arduous mountain roads. Compared to other BDR routes, this one appeared to have more rocky sections requiring intermediate to expert off-road skills.

Their route took them to several fire observation towers... climbing up winding hair-pin turn rocky fire roads where they eventually enjoyed looking for miles over the surrounding mountainous and wooded terrain. Of course the real challenge was coming down several thousand feet around the same hair-pin turns which were littered by rocks and wash-outs. These downhill stretches were the only place that they didn't ride close to each other. We all cringed on these steep downhill curves since there was no-where to quickly stop if you had to.




Tim James, the presenter, is also the Board President of BDR. He was an excellent speaker as well as very experienced BDR rider. He has been on most of the BDR rides.

There were thirteen riders in all including two women. The bikes included 3 BMWs, 2-Zeros, Suzuki, Honda, and KTMs. Two riders were hurt, one with leg injury and another with wrist issue but neither had to be ambulanced out. The cam-

era man hurt his leg. There were no more overhead drone videos after this point in the video. Electrical charging the Zeros wasn't a problem as presented in the video and discussed afterward. Most of the motels/Inns had electricity for charging with Tesla chargers available in many locations. The BDR chase vehicle also brought a generator that was used once and extra gas for the bikes with smaller tanks. One bike hit the dust... a Suzuki and another's chain broke without a spare master chain link on the bike. Luckily the chase vehicle had a spare bike and provided a large selection of master links. It is an excellent film.

And Finally...

Simon Whitelock holds the Guinness World Record for the functional vehicle with the most cylinders.

Now just to be clear, the record covers all motor vehicles not just motorcycles, and amazingly the bike is 100% road legal in the UK. That prodigious engine was built using 16 Kawasaki KH250 three-cylinder two-stroke engines arranged into six banks of eight cylinders, or 2 2/3 engines per bank.

Fast Facts – The Whitelock "Tinker Toy" Motorcycle The Whitelock "Tinker Toy" 48 cylinder motorcycle was built by Simon Whitelock of Britain and first unveiled back in 2003. Videos of this motorcycle being started up and run have been circulating online for over 20 years now, always attracting a great deal of attention.


That wildly complex engine has a total displacement is 4.2 liters and though the power isn't listed, each of the engines was originally capable of 32 bhp.

Theoretically the Tinker Toy engine could produce 512 bhp, though this seems unlikely.

There is actually a 49th cylinder, a single 125cc twostroke that is used as the starter motor. The bike has a custom frame, a Honda Goldwing front end, and a custom rear.

The Whitelock Tinker Toy holds the Guinness World Record as the functional vehicle with the most cylinders, a record that seems unlikely to be broken any time soon. The bike is now being offered for sale by Bonhams as part of their Spring Stafford Sale in April. The price guide starts at \$51,000 USD.

Editor's note: There's another maniac in Britain with similar skills: Allen Millyard. He's built 5 cylinder Kawasaki two strokes, V-12 motorcycles (from two inline sixes) and other insane motorcycles.
